

A Word from the President

All AARES members should have recently received their second email alert with the contents of the most recent AJARE issue – 69:4 – which includes 14 regular articles, a book review, and the announcements of the 2022 and 2023 AARES awards. We have now completed publishing the backlog of announcements. In Volume 69, as a whole, we published 55 regular articles, 3 opinion pieces, 3 book reviews, 2 obituaries, and 17 announcements. Updates from AARES Travel Award Winners

Reflections from the AARES Heading North Award Winner

Receiving the AARES Heading North Award and presenting my research at the Spanish Association of Agri-food Economics (AEEA) Conference in Granada, Spain, was a truly transformative experience in my early academic journey. As a PhD scholar, this opportunity allowed me to share my work on a global stage and engage with leading scholars in agricultural and resource economics. A particularly memorable moment was the opening address by a representative of the Spanish Ministry of Agriculture, who spoke passionately about the urgent challenges facing agri-food systems today. He emphasised the need for collaborative, science-based solutions to address climate change, food insecurity, and sustainability. His remarks underscored the importance of international cooperation and innovation in shaping resilient food systems that serve both people and the planet.

In addition to the special session, I attended several thematic panels focused on agricultural economics, food marketing, value chain dynamics, and policy innovation. These sessions provided rich insights into how economic research and evidence-based policymaking can address the evolving challenges of agri-food systems. Discussions on digital transformation, sustainability assessment, and inclusive value chain development were particularly relevant to my research and offered new perspectives to integrate into my work.
