The IAAE Conference on the Gold Coast, August 12 – 18 was a major success reflecting well on the local organising committee led by Julian Alston, Phil Pardey and Mal Wegener, on AARES and on Australia as a whole. There were 1,000 delegates with a gross turnover of about \$900,000 and sponsorship of about \$300,000 raised in Australia. There were 360 contributed papers, slightly fewer posters and 44 symposia. AARES provided 20 fellowships to support attendance at the Conference. During the Conference those who received the fellowships approached me to say how much they benefited from the Conference and their appreciation of AARES support. It was the first time I had attended an IAAE conference and the professional and personal experiences exceeded my expectations. Thanks again to Julian, Phil, Mal and their team for their efforts over several years to ensure the success of this event.

It is with much pleasure that I welcome, Tom Kompas, Quentin Grafton and Jeff Bennett from ANU as the new editorial team for AJARE to take over from Bob Lindner, Ross Kingwell and David Pannell for the 2008 – 2010 issues of the Journal. We wish Tom, Quentin and Jeff all the best and thank Bob, Ross and David for their work over the last three years in enhancing the quality of our journal. Recently the publisher, Wiley, has announced that it has acquired Blackwell, which publishes our journal. Any implications for AJARE and AARES are unclear at present. A new contract has to be negotiated for the publication of AJARE in 2007.

Our next AARES conference is at Queenstown, NZ, February 13 -16, 2007 – sounds like a brilliant venue again. Ross Cullen heads up the Local Organising Committee and reports below. Work on the AJAE is complete and now the process of scanning the RMAE begins. There will be a 'launch' of this new service at the Queenstown conference. It is a great service to the members and to the profession generally and should lead to a greater awareness and more frequent citing of Australian agricultural economics research.

AJARE EDITORS' REPORT

The flow of submissions is continuing at a similar rate to last year. As at 15 November, 2006, we had received 111 new submissions this year of which 13 have been accepted, 54 have been rejected. One paper submitted in 2005, and 44 submitted in 2006 are still in the review process.

The following summary statistics of submissions since December 2004 to mid November 2006 were generated by the Manuscript Central web site.

- 17 Book Reviews
- 2 Notes
- 300 Original Articles
- 12 Original Policy Forum Papers
- 8 Original Reviews
- 13 Special Issues

47:267 (18%) Accept Ratio

AJARE readers will know that issue 3 of Volume 50 was a bumper special issue on Economic and Policy Aspects of Water Resources. In addition to tributes to the 2006 Distinguished Fellows, it contained 8 original articles, 3 policy forum papers, and 2 book reviews. Because the first three issues of Volume 50 used up 474 pages of the budgeted 560 pages for Volume 50, issue 4 will be slimmer, and contain only 5 articles plus 4 book reviews, all of which are already accepted for publication. In addition, another 9 articles and one note have been accepted for issues 1 or 2 of Volume 51.

Following the successful 2006 IAAE Gold Coast conference, the editors of AJARE tabled a proposal at the September meeting of the Federal Council of AARES for a Special Issue of AJARE on "Developing Country Issues and Applications". This proposal was developed jointly with K. Otsuka, K.P. Kalirajan, and Tom Kompas, to provide an outlet for papers presented at the 2006 IAAE Gold Coast conference, as well as papers submitted in response to a general call for papers on the above theme. The issue would reflect AARES' interest in facilitating growth of the agricultural and resource economics discipline in developing countries.

After discussion, the Federal Council of AARES decided not to proceed with such a special issue, and instead issued a general invitation to all authors of papers presented at IAAE 2006 to consider submitting their papers to AJARE. All such manuscripts will be reviewed in the normal manner, and published, if they meet AJARE standards, in a normal issue of AJARE, rather than in a special issue.

At the same meeting, Federal Council considered Expressions of Interest for appointment as incoming editors of AJARE during 2007 to edit Volumes 52 – 54. Council decided to accept the expression of interest from Tom Kompas, Quentin Grafton and Jeff Bennett from ANU.

Heading North AARES

AAEA Young Professionals Exchange Travel Award

The Australian Agricultural and Resource Economics Society (AARES) and the Foundation of the American Agricultural Economics Association (AAEA) will jointly offer two travel awards during 2006. These awards are intended for Agricultural and Resource Economists of all ages but in the early stages of their careers. Thus, stage of career rather than age is what defines an appropriate applicant. The objectives of the awards are to provide the winners with an opportunity for professional and personal development and international professional and cultural exchange. Each award will have a value of US\$2,000 to be used to assist the winner to participate in the annual conference of either the AARES or the AAEA. Applicants for both awards must be members of both the AARES and the AAEA.

The "Heading North" award will be given to members normally resident in Australia or New Zealand to support their participation in the July 29 -August 1, 2007 Joint Annual Meeting of AAEA, WAEA and CAES at Portland, Oregon. This award is valued at US\$2,000 cash. Members meeting the stated criteria are now invited to apply for the "Heading North" award.

Applications should include:

- a paper for presentation at the AAEA conference, for which they are sole or first author and representing their original and unpublished work,

- a one-page biographical statement, and

- a one-page statement in support of their application, indicating what they would hope to accomplish through the award, and why they would be deserving of the award.

The winner of the award will be determined by a committee, based on the submitted materials, with some emphasis on the quality of the paper.

Applications must be received by 26 Jan 2007, and the winner will be announced at the AARES 2007 conference in Queenstown. Please address any questions about the application process to John Gibson.

Environmental Valuation Reference Inventory (EVRI)

The NSW Department of Environment and Conservation (DEC) is currently funding, on behalf of Australia, a 2-year pilot membership of the Environmental Valuation Reference Inventory (EVRI). EVRI is a Canadian run international environmental valuation database supported by Canada, France, UK, USA and Australia. This web-based database contains over 1,800 international studies providing values, methodologies, techniques and theories on environmental valuation and the benefits transfer approach.

The key features of EVRI include:

- a website with state-of-the-art search engines
- a database dedicated to the environmental valuation of various natural assets

• a reference library on benefits transfer theory.

The DEC's sponsorship of EVRI allows Australian residents to have **free** access to this growing database. Environmental valuation techniques are used globally to support research, policy development and regulation. EVRI is an invaluable resource for economists, researchers, policymakers, consultants, students and others interested in environmental valuation. Australian authors are encouraged to contribute their work to enhance the usefulness of EVRI for Australian analysts.

An evaluation of the Australian EVRI membership is to be undertaken during the pilot. The results of this evaluation will provide key input into DEC's recommendations regarding the future status of both Australia's EVRI membership and also that of ENVALUE (a comparable DEC run environmental valuation database). The Department would appreciate hearing from Australian EVRI or ENVALUE users potentially interested in participating in the evaluation.
