Each year there is an informal tradition that the AARES President attends and is a speaker at the New Zealand Agricultural and Resource Economics conference. I really enjoyed my involvement this year, with the conference held in Hamilton on the 29th and 30th of August. The NZARES President, Tony Schischka, and our AARES NZ delegate, Darran Austin, did a great job to make me welcome. It was striking to go to a location where it rains all the time, in stark contrast to current conditions in central Oueensland and most of eastern Australia.

The NZARES conference is smaller than AARES with about 60 attendees, but this generates a lot of advantages. I really enjoyed the quality of the presentations, a close focus on policy issues, and a lot more interdisciplinary work than we typically see at AARES. CHILDCARE

For delegates requiring child care services during the conference, there will be a subsidy offered by AARES. The subsidy is subject to availability and will depend on the number of applicants, so we recommend getting in touch soon if you require child care services at office@aares.org.au

ACCOMODATION

There are many options for accommodation near the conference venue on the UWA Crawley campus. Accommodation ranges from modern, hotel-like rooms (at St Catherine's on Park, Trinity on Hampden and Forrest Hall) to basic and affordable, college-style rooms (at St Catherine's and in shared townhouses). Delegates are recommended to book early, as oncampus accommodation is limited. There are several AirBnB's within walking distance of the UWA campus, and a basic motel close to King's Park. There are regular busses from the Perth CBD to the UWA campus, with bus-stops within 300 metres of the UWA University Club. Four hotels provided special discount codes for AARES conference delegates. Donna Brennan

Donna was a high achiever throughout her life. I remember tutoring her agricultural economics class in the second year of her undergraduate degree (I was only in fourth year myself) and she quickly and clearly stood out as someone with intelligence and confidence.

She completed her PhD at the University of Western Australia in 1991. It was an outstanding piece of work that subsequently won the award of the Australian Agricultural Economics Society for the best thesis of the year in Australia or New Zealand.

Her work experience included stints at the Western Australian Department of Agriculture, the University of California, Berkeley, the University of Western Australia, the Ministry of Food, Dhaka, Bangladesh, the Australian Bureau of Agricultural and Resource Economics, the University of Sydney, the Australian Centre for International Agricultural Research, and as a self-employed consultant.

In all of these organisations and roles, she impressed with the consistently excellent quality of her work. In her later years, she focused her work on Vietnam. As usual, she put her intellect and determination to excellent use. She engaged intimately with farmers and their families, cut through the Vietnamese bureaucracy with her intellect and willpower, astutely identified many problems with the farming systems she dealt with, and was able to find and implement a number of solutions. Her work meant that tens of thousands of villagers have more food and higher incomes.

Finally, here is a brief extract from Donna's eulogy that speaks volumes."Donna was truly an intelligent and determined woman with a generous heart and we are all privileged to have shared her life. For decades she has faced mortality with strength of character as time and time again, she successfully battled the disease. Her strength, sharp wit in the face of adversity and positive outlook will forever inspire us all." -David Pannell UWA

ESSE AND EAERE 2019 Anthea Coggan CSIRO

In June/July 2019 I was very fortunate to be funded by the CSIRO to attend the European Society of Ecological Economics Conference in Turkey, Finland and the European Association of Environmental Economics Conference in Manchester, UK.

Whilst in the Northern Hemisphere I also ran a seminar on environmental offsets with the Finish Environment Institute (photo 1) and a seminar on Australian landholder participation in environmental stewardship programs at Leeds University (UK).

The ESEE conference focused on co-creation in environmental policy. Co-creation in policy development was discussed from many different angles and in different forums, from the philosophy of co-creation through to co-creation on-ground and in practice. Finland is a beautiful country - being in Finland at midsummer saw many a midsummer party invitation and not a great deal of sleep! (see photo 2).

At the EAERE conference I attended the pre-conference workshop on Behavioural and Experimental Economic Methods where discussion focussed on advances in methods and applications. The EAERE plenaries focussed on designing optimal (?) forest conservation interventions in developing countries (Prof Daan van Soest, Tilburg University) and climate migration (Katrin Millock, Paris School of Economics).

In the down time, the EAERE organised a social run (see photo 3) and we found the local pool where I decided not to join the 'local' swim squad as they looked a bit fast for me – turned out they were the national team! (see photo 4).
